## President's Message



Since joining SCWDC, I have had the opportunity to ski great resorts. I have skied Snowmass and Aspen Highlands, Snowbird and Alta, Powder Mountain and Snowbasin, Copper Mountain and Big Sky. I have skied/hiked to terrain at Sun Peaks and Revelstoke. And I have skied many laps at Liberty and Whitetail, Timberline, and Snowshoe.

Several years ago, I had the opportunity to take my niece skiing for the first time. We spent most of the morning in the beginner area at Hidden Valley, PA. She followed me down the hill as we made wide, gentle S turns. At first, she stopped by running into me, but she gained confidence and was soon making turns and controlling her speed. She was so proud to show her new skills to her Dad who was watching from the bottom of the hill. After several hours in the beginner area, we headed to the chairlift. From the top of the mountain we took Bobcat Trail back to the base area. To an experienced skier, Bobcat is the gentlest green trail. To a first-time skier, it is a new challenge. There were a few bumps, but we made it back and stopped near the top of the beginner area.

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She wanted to ski the last part on her own and asked to go in front. Almost immediately I could see that she was out of control. The only way she was going to stop was to hit someone or something. My first thought was, "If this child gets hurt, her parents are going to kill me." My second thought was "Worse than that, they are never going to let her go skiing again." I took off after her, grabbed her coat by the shoulder, put on the brakes and glided to stop, right in front of Dad. It was probably only a matter of seconds during which she was skiing out of control, but three or four seconds of an out-of-control skier seems like a very long time.

I have skied in a lot of great places, but the best skiing that I have ever done was when I was able to catch up to my niece at the bottom of a beginner run on a mountain in Pennsylvania that has 100 acres and 450 feet of vertical.

SCWDC will have plenty of opportunities for great skiing this winter. Spend some time on the mountain with us.

Ski Club Indoor Tennis parties are held almost every Saturday night from October through April. Tennis parties provide competitive social doubles and mixed doubles, where players enjoy good tennis, mingle, and enjoy a light buffet and beverages.

### Who is eligible to attend?

Parties are for adults over 21 years of age who are experienced intermediate players (NTRP 2.5 to 4.5 or higher). If you are not sure of your numerical rating, please review the USTA's National Tennis Rating Program (NTRP) guidelines National Tennis Rating Program (to discuss your level, contact Jack Tarr (jtarr5@verizon.net)). Attendance is typically a mix of active singles and couples from their late 20's to 60's. Parties average 64 players each week. but some have up to 80 in attendance. Male/female split is close to 50/50 at each party. Newcomers and non-SCWDC members are welcome. Non-players are also welcome, just pay \$10 at the door and you can eat, drink, and socialize.

### Where & when are the parties held?

Most tennis parties are held at Fairfax Racquet Club in Virginia. Three parties will be held at Georgetown Prep Tennis Club in Maryland this season. Check-in begins at 6:15 p.m., and scheduled tennis play is from 7 p.m. to 11 p.m. Please allow for traffic delays to ensure arrival on time. If you arrive after 7:30 p.m. you may be replaced by a standby, and will forfeit the entire party cost. You can register for each party in advance, and pay online. SCWDC members pay \$20, non-members pay \$25.

### NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NOTE 1 - Organization and Summary of Accounting Policies (continued)

- g) Income Taxes The Club is a nonprofit organization exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)(7) of the Internal Revenue Code on all income other than unrelated business income. The Club has been classified as an organization that is not a private foundation. Unrelated business income, from non-member, advertising and interest income, for the years ended April 30, 2017 and 2016 totaled \$710 and \$2,889 respectively. Federal and state income tax expense for the years ended April 30, 2017 and 2016 was \$8 and \$397, respectively.
- in Tax Positions As of April 30, 2017, the Club had no uncertain tax position qualify for either recognition or disclosure in the financial statements. The tax years subject to tion by the taxing authorities are the years ended April 30, 2014 through 2016.
- i) Accounts Receivable Accounts receivable are reported net of an allowance for uncollectible Accounts Receivable — Accounts receivable are reported net of an allowance for uncollectable accounts. The allowance for uncollectable receivables is provided based on management's evaluation of uncollectable accounts at year end. The accounts receivable balance on the statement of financial position consists of receivables from members for activities completed during the fiscal year and a tour company. The allowance for doubtful accounts as of April 30, 2017 and 2016 were \$-0- and \$-0-, respectively. Bad debt expense for the years ended April 30, 2017 and 2016 were \$5,750 and \$-0-, respectively.
- j) Property and Equipment Purchased property and equipment are recorded at cost for any item in excess of \$500. Contributed property and equipment is recorded at its fair market value on the date of contribution. Expenditures for maintenance and repairs are charged against income as incurred; betterments, which increase the value or materially extend the life of the related assets, are

Depreciation and amortization expense is computed using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the respective assets. Depreciation expense for the years ended April 30, 2017 and 2016 were \$4.462 and \$4.388, respectively. The estimated useful lives are:

Furniture and Equipment. 3 to 10 years

Building 35 years

Advertising Cost – Advertising costs are expensed when incurred. Advertising expense for the years ended April 30, 2017 and 2016 were \$-0- and \$-0-, respectively.

NOTE 2 - Donated Services and Materials

### NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NOTE 1 - Organization and Summary of Accounting Policies

The Ski Club of Washington, D.C. ("the Club") is a non-profit organization established for the social and recreational benefit of its members. The organization was started in 1936 and recognized by the IRS as a tax exempt organization in 1963. Its primary sources of funds are from membership dues and activity fees collected from the participating members. The Club conducts over 150 ski, recreation or social events and activities for its members each year.

The following is a summary of significant accounting policies followed in the preparation of these

- a) Basis of Accounting The Club prepares its financial statements in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, which involves the application of accrual accounting consequently, revenues and gains are recognized when earned, and expenses and losses are recognized when incurred.
- b) Basis of Presentation The Club is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets, and permanently restricted net assets. The Club has no temporarily restricted or permanently restricted net assets.
- Support and Expenses Contributions received and unconditional promises to give are measured at their fair values and are reported as increases in unrestricted, temporarily restricted, or permanently restricted net assets, depending on the existence and/or nature of any donor restriction

Contributions that are restricted by the donor are reported as increases in unrestricted net assets if the restrictions expire (that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished) in the reporting period in which the revenue is recognized. All other donor-restricted contributions are reported as increases in temporarily restricted or permanently restricted net assets, depending on the nature of the restrictions. When a restriction expires, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported in the statement of articles are reclassified from serticities. activities as not assets released from restrictions.

- d) Statement of Cash Flows The Club considers substantially all highly liquid investments with an initial maturity of three months or less when purchased to be cash equivalents.
- e) Use of Estimates The preparation of financial statements in conformity with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.
- f) Concentration of Credit Risk The Club occasionally maintains deposits in excess of federally insured limits. These items are identified as a concentration of credit risk requiring disclosure, regardless of the degree of risk. The risk is managed by maintaining all deposits in high quality financial institutions. The Club has not experienced any losses on its cash accounts.

NOTE 3 - Prepaid Membership Dues

Club members have the option to purchase their membership in increments of one year, three years, five years, ten years or life.
